We analyze Smithsonian aspirations around the world, build and manage relationships with key global partners, and lead information sharing to ensure all in the Institution are aware of major global programs and priorities.

Through coordinated global engagement, we ensure that we speak as one Smithsonian voice and bolster each other's goals.

COUNTRY INVENTORIES

OIR inventoried Smithsonian partnerships, programs, publications, collections, and research in 115 countries.

These materials provide critical background information on Smithsonian activities around the world and are available to all Smithsonian units.

Highlights from 2016 include:

CHINA OIR led a trip in August to Beijing with colleagues from the Center for Folklife and Cultural Heritage and Smithsonian Enterprises to deepen our relationships with our Ministry of Culture counterparts.

MYANMAR OIR worked with the Conservation Biology Institute and the National Museum for Natural History to expand our presence in one of the Smithsonian's legacy countries by providing support to multiple grants, partner units and experts.

AROUND THE WORLD OIR and our in-office **U.S. Department of State liaison** coordinated diplomatic visits to the Smithsonian and of
Smithsonian experts abroad. OIR supported activities involving the
diplomatic community across our museums, especially the opening of the **National Museum of African American History and Culture.**

OIR coordinates international visits to the Smithsonian from foreign governments, international partner organizations, and the U.S. Department of State. In 2016, we coordinated

PROMOTING SMITHSONIAN GLOBAL THOUGHT LEADERSHIP

We communicate our collective impact and elevate the Smithsonian's standing on a global stage. We raise the profile of international programs and we work closely with unit and program leadership to share our exhibitions and programs with a growing global audience.

In 2016, OIR launched Smithsonian Global, a new website that weaves together a cohesive, pan-institutional story about the global breadth and depth of Smithsonian's work, driving key audiences to Smithsonian units.

OIR led the Smithsonian Global communications strategy with support from more than 100 Smithsonian colleagues.

The site has a database and reporting tool to document and share information about international Smithsonian activities, and is available in five languages, with 10 video features, and stories from 21 Smithsonian units.

A GLOBAL THOUGHT LEADER

In 2016, OIR worked with multilateral organizations and governments around the world to enhance the Smithsonian's international standing, including:

WORLD ECONOMIC FORUM

OIR established a new relationship with the World Economic Forum to feature Smithsonian scientists and cultural experts on an ongoing basis at global gatherings in China and Europe - a major platform for building strategic institutional relationships.

WORLD CUSTOMS ORGANIZATION

OIR addressed the annual gathering of world customs officials and built a new partnership with the World Customs Organization to combat and prevent the illicit traffic of cultural objects. We signed an MOU in July 2016, and are developing a set of trainings for 2017.

UNESCO
OIR presented the Smithsonian to cultural leaders from Europe and the Middle East at UNESCO headquarters in October 2016, highlighting Smithsonian engagements across our units to preserve and sustain cultural heritage in times of crisis and peace.

SUPPORTING SMITHSONIAN GLOBAL PROGRAMS

We are an opportunity incubator for global programs at the Smithsonian.

OIR partners with units across the Institution to craft successful strategies and proposals for new initiatives and programs, and secure new opportunities to amplify our impact in the world. We encourage new ideas and ways of working, and support the management and execution of global programs.

AMERICAN SPACES ASSESSMENT AND REDESIGN

Under a 2012 institutional MOU with the U.S. Department of State, OIR has worked with the Bureau of International Information Programs over the past 4 years to support the enhancement of 700+ cultural outreach venues called "American Spaces" around the world.

Through this partnership, we connected 16 million new people, many of them youth, with Smithsonian content. OIR coordinates this long-term partnership, providing Smithsonian expertise in programs, space and exhibition design to increase visitor engagement.

BAGH: BENGAL TIGER CONSERVATION ACTIVITY

The Smithsonian leads all research activities for the Bengal Tiger Conservation Activity (BAGH), a U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) and Government of Bangladesh project to protect wild tigers in Bangladesh.

OIR works with the Smithsonian Conservation Biology Institute, the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center, and our local partner, WildTeam, to support priority research on management interventions for targeted landscapes, activities that support our units' missions to conserve global biodiversity. OIR supports overall program management and capacity building.

MY ARMENIA: THE ARMENIA CULTURAL TOURISM DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

Building on our **2013 institutional MOU with USAID**, My Armenia is a five-year USAID-funded program to support cultural tourism development in Armenia. This new program puts the 'culture' back in cultural tourism.

OIR works closely with the Center for Folklife and Cultural Heritage, sustainable tourism firm Solimar International, and local organizations to research and document Armenian cultural heritage; assess and strengthen museums, local festivals and cultural activities in Armenia; and support local capacity building.

IRAQI INSTITUTE FOR THE CONSERVATION OF ANTIQUITIES AND HERITAGE (IICAH) CULTURAL HERITAGE TRAININGS

With support from the U.S. Department of State, the Museum Conservation Institute and Cultural Rescue Initiative are offering short-term education programs for heritage professionals from across Iraq to develop improved skills to document, protect, and recover from the current threats to cultural heritage. OIR is providing coordination with the U.S. Department of State, and management and logistical support throughout the development and implementation of this training program.

global programs and program proposals,

across 31 Smithsonian units in 30 countries.



GLOBAL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

OIR works with our units and peer institutions around the world to coordinate and deliver professional development trainings, building global peer networks and strengthening Smithsonian's cultural and natural conservation efforts.

The following pages summarize some of our recent efforts.

GLOBAL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

TUNISIA: Smithsonian experts from the Office of Public Affairs, Office of Protection Services, and OIR conducted a week-long training for Tunisian cultural and tourism professionals from the Ministry of Tourism, Ministry of Culture, and the Bardo Museum.

colombia: With USAID support, OIR led two research trips to support a new National Museum of Memory. Experts from the Center for Folklife and Cultural Heritage, the National Museum of American History, Smithsonian Facilities, and OIR led discussions on museum planning, education, and programming, and produced recommendation reports for Colombian teams working on the Museum.

BOSNIA and HERZEGOVINA: Experts from the Museum Conservation Institute, the National Museum of the American Indian, and OIR consulted for the National Museum in Sarajevo. The team jointly assessed the museum with local staff and discussed best practices in collections management.

GLOBAL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Foreign Service Institute Trainings: Since 2012, OIR has established a standardized approach to briefing foreign and U.S. ambassadors on Smithsonian projects of interest in their respective countries and a regular course for the U.S. Department of State's Foreign Service Institute. In 2016, OIR delivered trainings to 164 outgoing Foreign Service Officers, making Smithsonian resources accessible for U.S. diplomats overseas.

Training for Customs and Border Patrol Officers: Since 2009, the Smithsonian's Museum Conservation Institute has worked with the U.S. Department of State – with support from OIR – to deliver trainings on Preventing Illicit Trafficking in Antiquities and Other Cultural Property, primarily for personnel from the Department of Homeland Security. The 12th training occurred in Fall 2016.

COORDINATING SMITHSONIAN GLOBAL OPERATIONS AND RISK MANAGEMENT

We work with fellow units to advise and coordinate development of new protocols for international programs, keeping our staff safe, maximizing efficiencies, and mitigating risks to the Institution.

International Travel Task Force: In 2016 OIR and the Travel Management Office led a new approach to increase Smithsonian traveler safety and security evaluations of overseas programs.

Visas: OIR provides comprehensive immigration support to enable the Institution to host a variety of types of international visitors, including scientists, researchers, fellows, interns, employees and others. In 2016 OIR sponsored

223 J-1 Exchange Visitors, 6 H-1B Employees, and advised on dozens of cases.

International Services Brown Bags: OIR launched its first brown bag series of workshops for SI staff to learn more about updated and upgraded support services OIR offers for passport, visa categories, travel issues and more.
